**SUBJECT:** Sharp Hill Preservation Society Grant Reallocation Request

#### **POLICY DIRECTION:**

Community Recreation Funding Policy C-317 states that, for approved applications, *grant extensions* or minor changes in the project's scope may be granted at the discretion of the Chief Administrative Officer. Given that the Sharp Hill Preservation Society (SHPS) has defined a significant change in scope of work for the project funding that was provided to the group in Spring 2019, the Recreation Governance Committee (RGC) is being asked to consider their request.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

In the spring of 2019, Council granted SHPS \$5,000 of capital funds to pay for parking lot design on the east MR in Sharp Hill. On September 30, 2020, SHPS requested that they be permitted to reallocate these funds to further landscaping of the east MR lands that they currently maintain.

As the RGC is the final approving authority for all recreation matters under the approved Terms of Reference, this request is before RGC for consideration.

#### ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION:

Administration recommends approval in accordance with Option #1.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

On June 26, 2012, Council approved the SHPS to improve the subject Municipal Reserve. These plans are provided in Attachment 'A'.

On May 28, 2020, Council approved \$18,600 in operational funding for SHPS, \$5,000 of which was provided as a non-matching capital component, under the April 24, 2017, revision of Policy C-317. The \$5,000 capital allocation was assigned for an engineering firm to prepare parking lot plans for the east MR. The SHPS Board has since decided to address the development of a parking lot at a later date, as current construction costs would be prohibitive.

In a letter dated September 30, 2020 (Attachment 'B') SHPS requested that the RGC grant permission to reallocate the \$5,000 to pay for screened loam and mulch for new tree beds, as well as the trees, fertilizer, water, and other supplies that would be required to improve the east MR parcel. The proposed improvements align with the plans approved by Council in 2012. Associated costs and locations of these improvements (circled in red on the map) are provided in Attachment 'C'.

## **BUDGET IMPLICATIONS:**

There are no budget implications, as the \$5,000 grant has already been allocated to SHPS.














SHARP HILL PROJECT PHASE THREE CONCEPT LANDSCAPE PLAN VIEW

To whom it may concern,

The Sharp Hill Preservation Society requests to re-allocate \$5,000, initially requested to pay for parking lot design on the East MR in Sharp Hill, to now be used for further landscaping on the MR land in Sharp Hill.

For the past couple of years the Sharp Hill Preservation Society has been looking at options to offer more recreation opportunities on the MR land. One option that was being explored, was to create a disc (Frisbee) golf course. With the addition of the course, we knew that additional parking would be required, and therefore intended to begin designing the required parking lot.

After a meeting with a number of County representatives at the MR land this summer, the Board members of the Sharp Hill Preservation Society has decided to postpone developing the disc golf course. The parking lot area was always in the conceptual design for the park space, and will be addressed at a later date. Construction costs for the parking lot would be prohibitive at this time, and so the Board has decided to put our focus back on adding tree beds and other landscaping as we've done in the past.

The addition of the tree beds, benches, picnic tables and interpretive signs on the West MR has created a beautiful park space. Our goal is to continue adding trees and a mowed pathway on the East MR, where we also see regular use from people out walking, or walking their dogs.

The \$5,000 would be used to pay for screened loam and mulch for new tree beds, as well as the trees, fertilizer, water etc that would be required. We have a dedicated group of volunteers in the community that would undertake the majority of the work to create the new tree beds, so a large portion of the costs normally required for a project like this will be donated and volunteer hours.

Depending on the number of loads, and the size of the loads required, delivery charges may also apply.

To create multiple tree beds on the East MR, we estimate we will need at least a few loads of both loam to plant the trees in, and mulch to keep weeds down and hold moisture for the newly planted trees.

The balance of the funds provided would be used to purchase trees (trees vary in price from \$100/ea to \$600/ea depending on the size and species) and shrubs are in the \$25-50 range. Other costs would include fertilizer, water, equipment costs for the use of tractors or a bobcat etc.

As for the West MR, the Society intends to organize a work bee day to create the tree beds. Local residents would provide volunteer labour and equipment if they have it. Trees would either be purchased from a local nursery, or can also be acquired by taking out a Forestry Reserve permit and dug by volunteers. Community members could also be encouraged to provide seedlings from their own yards to add to the tree beds.
